**Dear friends,**

Welcome to the February Edition of Window on Wesley's, this month with a guest editor in our Leysian Missioner, Thomas Smith.

Friends, we are now six months into Stephen and Myrtle Poxon's time at Wesley's Chapel, and their presence has made a real difference among us: we have re-planted a Men's Fellowship breakfast, developed our pastoral care, gathered a young adults group, supported the Boys Brigade/Girls Association, and supported our Global Mission Fellow. With their help we have also made real strides to take forward a 'Vision 250' programme of property renewal and refurbishment to support mission in advance of our 250th anniversary in 2028: trustees have been hard at work in the background. Also, you will have noticed a new pattern of Sunday worship at 11 AM: since September we have had Communion on the first Sunday, an element of Testimony (Advent Voices, This Time Tomorrow) on the second, a chance to come forward for healing prayer on the third, and a combination of teaching and/or special music on the fourth. This while supporting the development of our adult choir and laying the foundation for children's music ministry. Every Sunday is special but we want to thicken the broth, to give more depth to the whole diet of worship for this Circuit.

This month of February is called 'stick season' in my home region of New England in the USA, because the trees are stark and the weather cold: it can feel a bit like that in church as well. But friends, already the buds are formed in the branches, even if we have some days to go yet before we see the leaf and flower. Real growth is slow, steady, and sustainable, and I am terrifically proud of the vision this church is developing, and the lives you all lead. Courage, friends, and onwards.

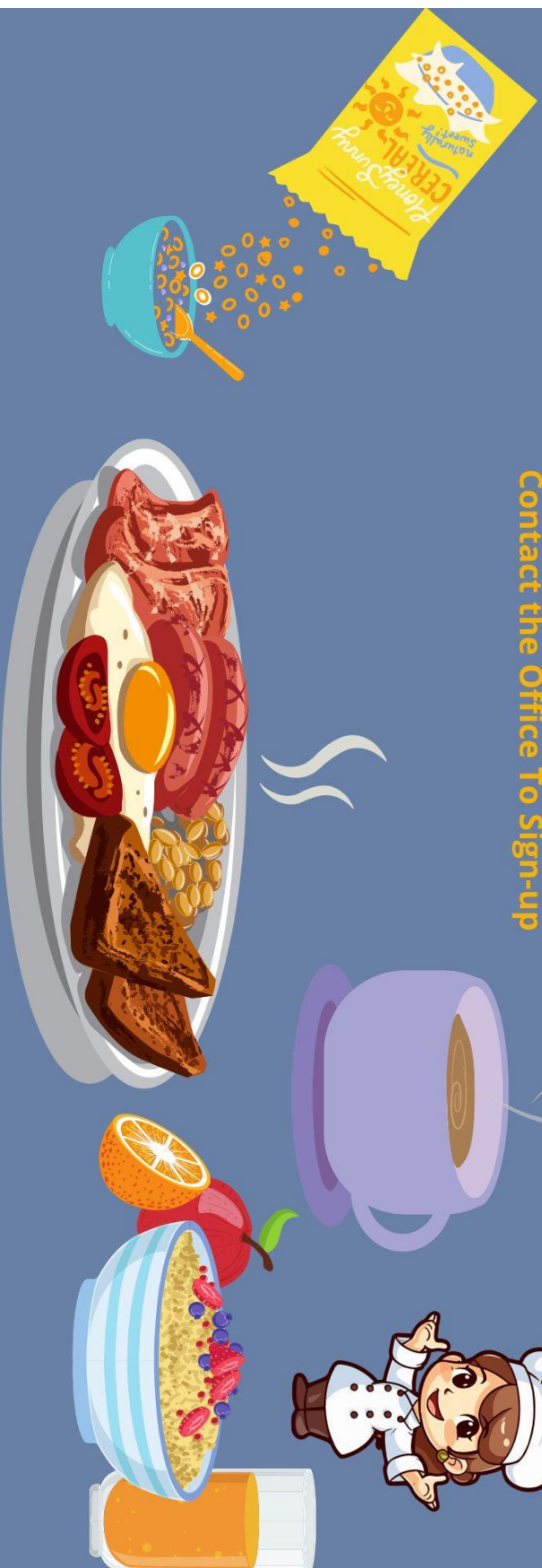

## **Leadership on a Journey exhibition on tour**

Do you remember our 'Leadership on a Journey' exhibition shown here at Wesley's in two phases in 2021 and 2022? It is now also a permanent feature online on our Wesley Heritage website ([www.wesleysheritage.org.uk](http://www.wesleysheritage.org.uk)). The show celebrates the rich diversity that exists within the Methodist Church. Inspired by the death of George Floyd (2020) and the 'Black Lives Matter' campaign, the exhibition formed a first step in celebrating an inclusive vision of leadership in the Church.

Excellent news - the show has gone on tour to John Wesley's New Room in Bristol! Everything was couriered to Bristol by the Methodist Heritage Officer in December and is now on show in the New Room's exhibition galleries until Easter. It is just one example of how the four major Methodist Heritage sites – The Museum of Methodism, John Wesley's New Room, Epworth Old Rectory and Englesea Brook Chapel – are working together to interpret and show the Church's history and heritage.

John Wesley's New Room is the oldest purpose-built Methodist building in the world, founded in 1739 by John Wesley. It was refurbished extensively in 2017. ([www.newroombristol.org.uk](http://www.newroombristol.org.uk)). John Wesley's New Room is very centrally located and, if you find yourself in Bristol and haven't been yet, it is definitely worth a visit.

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## **“Behind the Scenes at the Museum”, Talks Programme, February 19 - 12 March, 2025**

Each Wednesday February 19, 26, March 5, 12 – for titles and further information, please see the flyer overleaf.

Join us for our informal winter talks programme in February and March exploring aspects of Georgian life through objects in our museum collection! Presentations will include John Wesley's life, clothing and literacy in the 18th century and the role of women in Methodism. The latter will be investigated by the Rev. Donna Fowler Marchant, our keynote speaker for the last session. She is

the author of 'Mothers in Israel (2021) and the title of her talk will be "Those Impudent Methodist Women".

Each session will be preceded by tea and biscuits in the Philadelphia Room (there is a nominal charge of £1.50 for this), followed by the talk in the museum (free). At 12.45pm there will be Holy Communion or, for those who wish to explore our site, John Wesley House tours.

Please note that small groups of three or above will be required to book for John Wesley House tours in advance of the talk, to ensure availability. Tours are chargeable at our usual rate of £6pp.

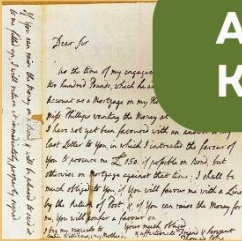

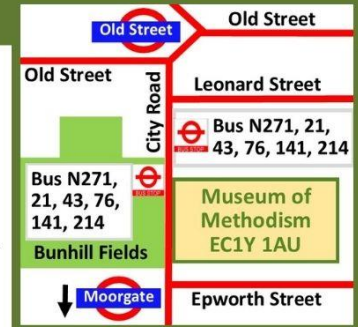

## Christmas at Wesley's

Wesley's welcomed several hundred people from the local community and further afield to our Christmas event on 12th December. This was a joint heritage and church event to spread some Christmas cheer.

The day kicked off with sixty local school children visiting a candle-lit John Wesley's House, to learn about Christmas in the 1700s and the origins of some of today's Christmas traditions. Don't worry, the candles were battery



operated as no real flames are allowed in our Grade 1 listed house! The house looked and smelt its best, adorned with Georgian style decorations made from fresh greenery, spices, coloured ribbons and dried fruit. The older children also visited the museum to learn about the life of John Wesley.

Some of the same children joined us afterwards for the City Carol Service in Wesley's Chapel, which was overseen by an enormous Christmas tree reaching up to the balcony. The service was attended

by the Mayor of Islington and the Metropolitan Police, and we were delighted that so many of our church family were able to attend, with some giving readings.

All those present enjoyed hearing a large and enthusiastic choir from The Lyceum School sing a wonderful Christmas song. Four pupils from the Central Foundation Boys' School







then put on a fabulous performance as a string quartet. And Wesley's current and former employees sang a lovely rendition of "Joy to the World." It was lovely to see so many passers-by take a few minutes out of their busy day to pop in and listen to the service.

After a welcome spread of lunchtime refreshments in the Radnor Hall, carols in the courtyard went ahead. This turned into a colourful affair due to the number of brightly-coloured

umbrellas going up! Despite the rain, the assembled carollers sung heartily and enjoyed a warming hot chocolate and mince pies afterwards.

Many of the carol singers then joined us for a busy re-enactment in John Wesley's House, led by our wonderful heritage stewards dressed in the costume of the 1700s. Some home-made biscuits were greatly enjoyed in the kitchen, with the caraway flavour being a particular favourite.



We were entertained by two talented musicians, who brought with them baroque instruments including a theorbo, with its hugely long neck, and a wooden baroque flute. A few visitors came just to hear these unusual instruments being played.

Visitors were invited to sit for a while, have a chat and make a Christmas decoration to take home.



Thanks to everyone who attended or helped with this event. Many people said how much they had enjoyed it; it was wonderful to spread some Christmas cheer.

## **LGBTQ+ History Month**

February is LGBTQ+ History Month. Each year has a theme, this year's is Activism and Social Change.

There are also selected five people from history (including at least one more recent historical figure) who are highlighted for the contributions to the world we live in today.

**Octavia Hill** – Key figure in the development of social housing, who also helped save Hampstead Heath and was a founder of the National Trust.

**Ivor Cummings** – First Black official in the Colonial Office, he was the official representative meeting the Empire Windrush. Helping people find work and homes in Britain both from the Caribbean and Africa was part of his work for much of the 1940s and 1950s. In 1958 he went to train diplomats in post-independence Ghana, and was for a time posted at the High Commission in London.

**Annie Kenney** – Founded the first Suffragette branch in London, and began their campaign of interrupting political meetings. She also promoted womens' rights and workers' rights, and claimed sanctuary in Lambeth Palace in 1914.

**Charlie Kiss** – One of the Greenham Common campers who danced on top of the missile silos, after transitioning he was the first trans man to run for parliament, standing for the Greens in Islington South & Finsbury (which includes the chapel) in 2015.

**Olaudah Equiano** – Enslaved as a child, he was baptized in 1759 and managed to buy his freedom in 1766. He became involved in the abolitionist movement in the 1780s. Having been influenced by both George Whitefield's preaching he was supported by Selina, Countess of Huntingdon to write his memoir, and worked as a Missionary.

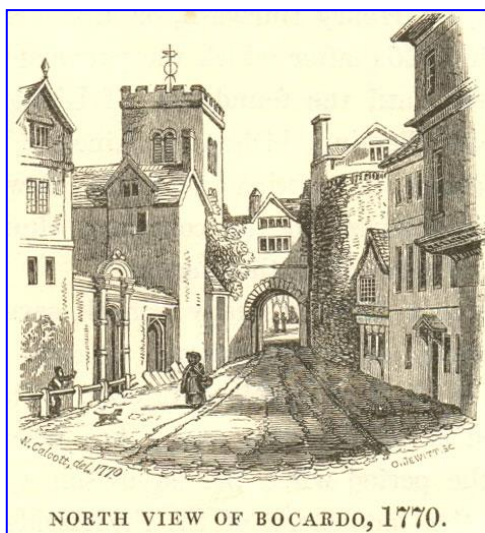
It is now three years since Wesley's Chapel & Leysian Mission decided to perform same-sex marriages.

Back in 1993 Conference passed a resolution that *Conference calls on the Methodist people to begin a **pilgrimage of faith** to combat repression and discrimination, to work for justice and human rights and to give dignity and worth to people whatever their sexuality.*

Blessing Same-Sex couples was first voted for in 2005 by Conference, although blessing marriages was not consulted on until 2013, this was still quite “ahead of the curve” as they wouldn't be legal until 2014! Approval to allow it was voted for in 2019 and 2021.

What would Mr Wesley think? In any situation it is dubious to say certainly what someone who died when same-sex relations were a capital offence would think of the present situation today. We know of course John and Charles were both “the marrying kind”, although it would be fair to say John was much less fortunate in marriage than Charles was.

Dr. Peter Forsaith, Research Fellow of the Oxford Centre for Methodism and Church History, Oxford Brookes University; wrote a blog last year for the Connexional website on what we do know about LGBTQ people and the early Methodists.



The first printed use of the term “Methodists” was on 5<sup>th</sup> November 1732, in a letter to a London newspaper criticising the “Sect call'd Methodists”. Among various dreadful things they had done was complain to the Oxford authorities of the treatment of one Mr Blair, being held in prison in the North Gate of Oxford, called the Bocardo. John and Charles thought he was being victimised and complained to the city and university authorities. He

was accused, it seems most likely, of being involved in a same-sex relationship.

Given their general advocacy for basic human decency for all, this would seem par for the course in many respects. Certainly since Mr Blair was only fined the brothers clearly didn't make things worse for him.

The idea of "Sexuality" was not articulated until after the Wesley's time. The phrase used then was "too indelicate to mention" or "a certain particular" in Methodist writings over preachers. We see these and similar turns of phrase used of James Perfect (who left the ministry in 1785) and Nathaniel Ward, who went over to the Countess of Huntingdon's Connexion.

While there had been talk of financial irregularities, the Countess enquired and was told, "Mr Ward had been very acceptable, and much respected, in Mr W—'s Connection. But being suspected in a certain Particular, he had been admonish'd; acknowledg'd his Error; and promis'd future Amendment. In this, however, he fail'd; the consequence of which was, he was dismissed the Connection."

Mary Hamilton was brought to Methodism and the affections of Anne Johnson, whom she lived with in Bristol. Mary later dressed as a man, married a widow in Dublin, where she was a Methodist teacher, and later married ladies in Devon and Somerset. So unusual was her life that she was tried under the Vagrancy act.

Dr Forsaith wrote further about early instances we know of in an article "...*too indelicate to mention*...": transgressive male sexualities in early Methodism.', *Methodist Review* 12 [online], January 2020.

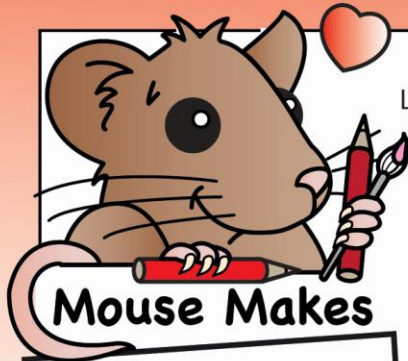
Craig, a seasoned event planner, brought his expertise and attention to detail to every aspect of the celebration.

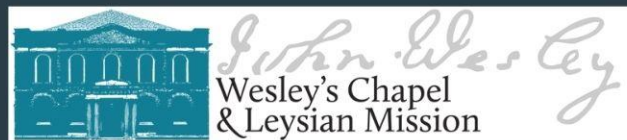
